January 2025 | January is National Radon Action Month

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What is radon?

- Often called an "invisible killer," radon is an odorless, colorless and tasteless gas that is harmful to people's health.
- Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer.
- According to the EPA, the entire state of Iowa is considered at high risk for radon gas in homes.

How does radon get inside?

Radon comes naturally from the ground. It can enter and build up inside any building without warning, causing risk to all that live inside.

In nearly all cases, radon gets into homes, schools and other buildings in a few ways:

- · Gaps and cracks in the foundation
- · Joints connecting walls and floors
- · Pipes, sumps, drains, walls and other openings



Per lowa Administrative Code 441-109(237A), all licensed child care centers must test for radon within 1 year of opening and retest every 2 years. Centers must mitigate if radon levels are above the EPA action level. Iowa child development homes and child care homes are encouraged to test for radon.
